My name is John Stone and I'd like to talk about the work of the Knowing Power, a rural enlightenment campaign of non-profit organization based mainly in Australia.

I first got the idea from watching a television programme about enlightenment campaign in the country of Guinea in Africa. I went there in 2002 just after graduating a masters degree at university. After one year of studying, I became so interested in caring and teaching the people in Africa. I loved voluntary work, [Q11] so I made up my mind to participate in a voluntary organization and was sent to Guinea to research land surveys. After three years, I came back to Australia in 2005 and I ran for the Knowing Power in earnest. There was a lot of poverty in the area of Guinea that I worked in.

At the Knowing Power, we gathered the people in a local area, Q12 teaching English and how to make a house or garden regularly. The demand for learning is enormous. Other villagers visited us to see the methods we were using to improve the lives of local people. Things such as building chimneys, making underground water and developing intensive farming can all make a big difference.

Fortunately, in September 2005 we won an Enterprise Award, which has helped us enormously. Also, we invested half of the 13 fifty-thousand-pound prize money to assist in ensuring our future scheme. Now there are many ways to operate programmes and raise public awareness sponsored by regular financial funds of the UK government organization we really wanted. When you think about any small business, it is usually **Q21** a family business. They are also trained and developed as a group. Of course, they may have different ideas but these ideas are based on their experiences and education, so it is critical that all members are able to brainstorm with each other.

TUTOR: So what do you think about differences of opinion in the workplace?

ROBERT: Umm, I think that there are many reasons why this can occur. The research particularly focuses on personality managing within a small company. Actually, it clearly shows the difference between men and women in terms of their methods and solutions at work.

TUTOR: Right, so... did you research the effects of family members working together within a small company?

ROBERT: Of course, I did. One advantage of this is being able to share thoughts and ideas with others in a way that stimulates the mind and helps save money. However, unfortunately, each new idea can cause controversy between employees and cause problems in 223 marketing and management.

TUTOR: I agree, Robert. Now, two more things we need to talk about are 24 personal talent and managing it effectively. So, Monica, did you have a perception of different talents among employees?

And how do you think it is efficient for employers to work?

MONICA: In my case, teamwork is emphasised in the workplace, so the personal skills of employees can often be overlooked. The thing that employers should be targeting is an acceptance of views and filter responsibility appropriately.

TUTOR: That's right, Monica. However, unfortunately many top managers think it is too difficult to make a unit when all employees' ideas are put together.

MONICA: I see, that should be the case but I think one of the hardest tasks for employers is considering the wants and needs of each employee, such as finding ways of cooperating, compromising and sometimes persuading the employees when they don't accept the target. So, it requires creative and broad thinking with other people.

TUTOR: So, what kind of people do you think are best for these companies?

MONICA: Well, the best solution starts from when the companies are looking for new staff. Of course, the responsibility of the human resource department should be to choose the best staff. Also, they have to learn and research personal management and psychological tests with confirmation of qualifications. It's so essential for them.

TUTOR: So, how about if the best team members are overestimated?

MONICA: No, they're not overestimated. You just need to learn steadily if you're working in an organization.

TUTOR: Right, so... how should managers cope with this situation?

MONICA: It's a carrot and stick. If all employees are following the rules and policies of the company, a manager may give them Q28 an incentive in order to save time and costs. Also, the incentive can be either a working condition they want to change or money.

TUTOR: Great. It's your turn, Robert. How important is it for a manager to be a good performer?

ROBERT: Umm, managing CEO means not only 229 sharing all employees' thoughts, but also understanding the culture of the organization. Actually, there needs to be a balance between creative minds and personal decisions during working time.

TUTOR: Exactly. Well done, Robert.

ROBERT: Thank you, sir. Clearly, sometimes, it is hard for the managing CEO to control the system. For instance, they should manage the changes in the workplace caused by crisis or loss with caution.

TUTOR: Right, sometimes, certain situations cause problems for the future management of the company.

Do you follow me, Robert?

ROBERT: Yes, I do. Actually, I have one more thing to say about high stress levels in the workplace. It akes time for a balance to be found between employers and employees.

TUTOR: That's a very interesting idea. So let's move on and talk about the marketing mix.

Good morning, everyone!

The first workshop is in preparation for our anthropological fieldwork in the Incan Civilization of South America; we are so happy to have received funding for separate studies for this field trip from our organization, so I shall expect over 90% attendance from you. In this workshop I'm going to begin by offering a brief introduction to contemporary studies on wall painting, and in the second part I'm going to show some examples of fieldwork, so please listen carefully.

I'm going to focus on interpretations of wall painting art in Peru. Fortunately, we are going to explain an area where you can find some of the most critical sites in the world. And I deeply hope to show you how they were made – this is the first and most important chapter we must study.

In Peru there are both engravings and Q31 paintings. Many of the engravings show Q32 totemism and most historians tend to think that the purpose of these was complicated and mixed. This wall art was like a museum guide book with pictures to teach students about the artworks. They represent nature – sun, moon, wind, water, fire, and so forth.

However, there were several mysteries. When you first see a typical Inca engraving or painting, you can see that the tracks are ossessible sophisticated. There are tracks for the movement of nature. Today, we'll learn how to make tracking.

Now there are two more things to consider. Why are some of the engravings of natural phenomenon very delicate but clearly ideological and others realistic?

Another mystery is some of the realistic natural phenomenon – that's in the engravings. For instance, some have odd god faces. Many researchers now think that these are pictures that were engraved by the craft masters. They believed they could use the providence of nature they had drawn, so the hunters could then mimic them for prosperity.

Most historians thought that the visitors looked at the wall paintings to understand their origins and solve the puzzles of the art and culture of the pictures. Now many scholars believe that wall art was more about enchantment. And we'll learn more about them next session.

In the third part of the workshop I'd like to explain some of the implications of our explored prehistoric site and understanding the wall arts.

We're going to visit lots of sites related to them. The single largest problem at these sites is visitors unintentionally ose touching and scratching the wall paintings.

Whenever you go over to a site in Inca, you'll learn and conserve many things made from the Incas because they are of good value to prehistoric research. Through the Q37 field trip, these visitors are able to get an educational experience.

And there are some essential rules to show you. There are Q38 traps that can happen suddenly and are very dangerous. Actually, they were a safe guard against enemies. So, you should always follow the information board in the forest with a local tour guide.

So, how are we going to feel the wall painting in our field trip? Don't forget: no touching, just leave it. The wall painting is painting is painting is painting is painting is painting is painting it is also a part of Peruvian heritage and a national treasure. This lesson is joining with a local community on the site. They run a special course and a trip around the historical site once a month.

Obviously, scratching or touching on the wall paintings can destroy in a moment what has lasted for thousands of years of Incan Civilization. Please, try to be extra careful and look out for your mates. Look carefully everywhere! And lastly please don't Q40 move any old materials to take a picture.

It was designed by the architect John Wood; it is among the greatest examples of Georgian architecture to be found in the United Kingdom and is a grade-I-listed building.

Further along at stop D Q16 Queen Square, the most exciting place to visit is Q17 the Roman baths used for the buildings housing their public baths. After sightseeing, you can visit the Theme Bath Spa but you have to pay for that by the hour.

Besides, there are city boat tours. Two local tour companies give special services:

The Roman Boat Company operates all of its tours with an audio tour guide service available in English, German, French, Korean, Japanese and Chinese. Tours leave from 9 a.m. every 30 minutes. The boat departs from the Palace Gardens. Tickets are valid for 19 48 hours.

Another company, The Best Boating View Co., is available with a live commentary in Q20 English only. Boats depart from Pulteney Bridge every hour from 9:30 a.m. with the last boat departing at 6:30 p.m. This service also offers refreshments free of charge.

We're very happy that the college authority has accepted the students' suggestions about the design of a new library and student union building. We deeply appreciate the beneficiaries of college library facilities for current students.

We have researched the best ways to find out students' opinions and use them to help us make decisions. Initially, there was a student union meeting that was held last week. Then, in the main hall in Kings building, we invited all students to hand in suggestions for the design of new buildings, placing cards in a suggestion box. The suggestions enabled us to design a questionnaire that was completed by around three thousand students over one month. As a result, the college authority collected the results and made a report. This presentation is basically a workshop based on the main points that came up in the questionnaire.

Most of all, regarding the critical areas of the site, we reviewed the four options which you have suggested. Number one will be in the centre of the college, near Q32 the fountain. Number two will be at the corner at maple in the north. Number three will be near the student accommodation building. And number four will be near Q33 the business school. We have reflected students' need to cite reasons for or against these sites. So, there were a number of issues with all four sites. It seems site one was so crowded and noisy. Q34 Site two is a popular choice because it's quiet and a short distance from the lecture rooms. Site three was unpopular due to parking problems. Finally, number four was too far from the other colleges.

Furthermore, our second suggestion for the student union building is obviously the facilities for Q35 leisure and sports. We would like a big fitness centre and if possible, a swimming pool that is close to competition size. Also, we want to set up a variety of things that cater to students' needs, such as a job centre, travel agent, language centre for international students, internet café, and so forth. Additionally, the Student Counseling Centre and luxury refectory will also be there. However, we are also considering Q36 a drama theatre. Just over 30% of the respondents were in favour of this and Q37 25% were against it. Around 45% were neutral. 70% of respondents are in favour of the student union building being located close to Q38 the accommodation buildings as this will be more convenient for them, although there are some concerns about security and fire.

Also, the Student Union deeply insisted that a video surveillance system and security guard team that check the video Students Union ID cards are in place. Finally, these buildings will be maintained well as this is important for students' welfare. As I said, further details and information will be given in our college newspaper but for now I would be glad to answer any questions you may have... (fade out)

Tea originated in China and was so popular that hundreds of people operated ceremonies in Eastern Asia. In Europe, tea was first imported by O31 British sailors through North Western Europe. It was then delivered by Dutch maritime traders in the 16th century. At that time, tea became available via Moscow from the Far East to Europe. Tea also stood for O32 independence as shown by the symbol of the American eagle from the Boston Tea Party.

In the last 400 years, tea leaves became available and practical throughout Asia and Europe. But the way people drank tea was changed a little. The Chinese regarded the quality of the leaves and utilised them as a vital part of their medical care. Other people added hot water, milk, sugar, spices like cinnamon and herbs like mint or sage to their tea. The variations of tea are unlimited. For instance, sesame oil is added to milky tea on chilly mornings in western Sudan. Unlike coffee, English tea has acquired a good reputation as a therapeutic drink that enhances the body condition. Actually, in European and Arabic countries as well as in the Middle-East and Russia, tea was considered a restorative and health-giving plant for a long time. According to Cornelius Blankaart, a physician from Holland, mentioned that to keep good health, people should drink at least eight cups a day. However, over 50 cups a day could cause severe health problems.

While European coffee houses were frequented by men for things such as business meetings, middle-class women spent the tea time with guests in the house. With the arrival of Q35 the 19th century the price of tea decreased and the common people took the chance to drink tea with enthusiasm. Luxury tea was sold in tea bags which were made of cotton to suit the upper classes.

Nowadays, although tea and coffee consumption has become a significant part of society, a few Islamic groups prohibit drinking tea because it oas contains the stimulant caffeine.

From the Middle Eastern tradition of the nomadic Bedouin, guests are served with tea topped with cardamom and glasses of sugared tea refilled by the host in the guest tents. For over 1,000 years, Arab traders have been bringing the tea culture of Islamic customs to northern and western Africa. The tea was boiled with a lot of sugar for a long time.

In India, tea drinking keeps an important custom of daily life going. The Indians are accustomed to drinking it with milk. "Chai" as they call it means oblining milk adding tea, sugar and some spices. This process of making tea has spread throughout the world. Surprisingly, the custom of making tea mixed with "milk or water" in cafés has been carried over to the preparation of observation of observations in other process. Today, at conferences and seminars in other process. Britain, tea remains the most commonly served beverage.

Hi, everyone! This morning I'm going to talk to you about flea markets in England.

At first, we were surprised to learn that only 15% of people here in England make an effort to collect waste. That is lower than other European countries. Also, it might be falling within a couple of year time unless the government make a severe regulations for industries and local residences.

The UK government's target means that by 2012 we must decrease our waste emissions by 232 45%, compared with 2000. Local councils can offer support to meet that target by taking part in the 233 national green campaign and investing in local flea markets. Most of all, these markets reduce waste emissions from landfill sites.

A flea market or oga4 "swap meet" is a type of bazaar where very cheap or second-hand goods are sold or bartered for. It may be indoors, like in a warehouse or school gymnasium; or it may be outdoors, like in a field or under a tent. The flea market vendors display the goods used on the table for selling, such as a few unwanted household items to operate commerce including a variety of used living products. Many flea markets in European countries have food vendors who sell snacks and drinks to the visitors, and may be part of a small event such as carnivals or concerts.

As part of our research, our team carried out a questionnaire with people in the local area. The results said we need to open more second-hand shops. However, one problem is that there is a lack of ormation and marketing. To solve the problems, local councils should invest and support in flea markets, by doing things like creating parking space, organising security, public promotions using the Internet and other resources.

We were also surprised to discover how waste, such as furniture, computers, kitchen tools, and other such things are reused. And wooden furniture or electronic products are easy to recycle because they can be reused over and over again without becoming weaker. Around three million electronic goods are thrown away per year. Also, around 500,000 pieces of furniture are also disposed of. Only one-fifth is collected and fortunately recycled through many local flea markets. In 2009 there were around 3,000 flea markets in England. The number is increasing... steadily... so far.

Surprisingly, by collecting under 15% of 037 old books, lots of paper is imported, so more paper can be recycled in the UK. Europe recycles 038 50% of its paper and 039 Germany recycles 80% of its paper. When recycling launched, there were quality problems, so it was so hard to reuse paper in office sheets. However, these problems have now been solved, and Union of the flea markets based in East London produces high-quality recycled paper. Another union, 040 "LOVING PAPER," currently sells the paper that has been through a sorting process to farmers or gardeners as fertilizer.

So, to sum up, there seems to be a number of activities that enable people to reuse waste but the substantial problem is encouraging people to think twice about taking their waste to a flea market instead of throwing it away. I think the recycling programme will make us save materials and protect the environment in future. And next, I'll show the plan for promoting it.


